Poetic Inquiry – what is it and why is it useful?

Poetic inquiry is approached differently depending on the researcher. I see it as the strategic and intuitive use of poetry to explore, reflect on, and represent lived experience. This approach allows poetry to serve as both a means of analysis and a way of presenting findings. It gives weight and legitimacy to emotional and subjective forms of knowledge—essential to understanding human experience, but often undervalued, especially in health-related fields.



Poetic inquiry takes many forms depending on the context. Some researchers use **poetic transcription** – they transform interview data into poems using participants' own words, tone, and rhythm. Others use **found poetry** – they extract key phrases from qualitative data to shape a new poetic form.

Autoethnographic poems in *Placing Unheard Voices*

In *Placing Unheard Voices*, I used autoethnography alongside phenomenology to position myself within the research and reflect on how my presence influenced the findings. This involved answering structured questions, free-writing, writing poems and working in

collaboration with illustrators. The image above is the result – its is an illustrated autoethnographic poem about my own experiences as a researcher living with Parkinson's. The use of different textures in both the image and the words, and the blurred yet precise imagery, communicate the complexity of illness and the power in using artistry to turn vulnerability to strength.

Poetic inquiry as a transformative methodology

Poetic inquiry challenges traditional academic writing while enhancing emotional resonance and championing subjective knowledge. It has been especially powerful in health research, education, disability studies, and social justice work—making research outputs more accessible, reflective, and emotionally honest.
